
## ABORTION & CANADA

The National Post breaks down the most recent complete numbers from the Canadian Institute for Health Information on abortion in Canada, gathered from provincial and territorial ministries of health, hospitals and independent abortion clinics (it doesn't include fee-for-service abortion data because it's of varying quality). While data from hospitals and clinics alone underestimates the number of abortions performed in Canada annually, for now it's the best way to produce comparable Canadian data. Below is a look at the 93,755 induced abortions reported in 2009 (the most recent year for which data were available).

## MOST COMMON METHODS OF INDUCED ABORTION IN CANADA



ASPIRATION AND CURETTAGE: Typically done at or under 10 weeks, when most abortions occur. The cervix is first widened using rods or by inserting seaweed that absorbs fluids and expands. A hollow, plastic tube is passed through the cervix into the uterus to suck out the tissue. Debris is scraped off the uterine wall using a metal spoon.



DILATION AND EVACUATION: This is less common and done when the fetus is too big to remove with suction. Once the cervix is dilated, a clamp-like instrument is used to break up the tissue and pull it out bit by bit. Suction is often used after to make sure there is no debris.



DILATION AND CURETTAGE: This is more rare and typically associated with miscarriages or early-stage pregnancies. After the cervix is dilated, a metal spoon is used to remove the tissue manually. Suction is sometimes used afterward.
